"American Idol" host RYAN SEACREST, KFI talk show host BILL HANDLE, and Dodger broadcasters CHARLIE STEI-NER and JAIME JARRIN were unable to attend, but sent video wishes.



PPB'S FIRST VICE PRESIDENT, LARRY VANDERVEEN, presented the Diamond Circle Award to producer/director/writer **STEVE BINDER**. Here are Larry's remarks:

Steve's journey to broadcast success began on the other side of the world — in Germany, as an announcer on American Forces Radio. From there, it was back to civilian life and into what would be the launching of a great career, the mail room at KABC-TV. It was to be a quick launch, very quick. In less than a month, at the ripe young age of 22, he was directing "The Soupy Sales Show" in prime time on the ABC Network.

Even though he was now network television's youngest director, he made a very big decision. He decided to go out on his own. Good decision, because not much later he was in a theater just across the street from the Hollywood landmark, The Hollywood Ranch Market at La Mirada and Vine Street, directing the super syndication hit, "The STEVE ALLEN Late Night Show."



After that, there was no stopping this talent. As he rolled on, there was hardly a major musical star whose TV specials he didn't either write, direct, produce, or all of the above. PETULA CLARK, DIANA ROSS, JOHN DENVER, DEBBY BOONE, LIZA MINELLI, OLIVIA Producer/director/writer STEVE BINDER (L) NEWTON-JOHN, and BAR-RY MANILOW were just a few of the many who joined the

parade. The Manilow special won an Emmy for the singer. Along the way, Steve stopped to receive his own Emmy and a Golden Globe Nomination. And it never quits. Just last month, Sony/ CBS released a DVD of his "Lucy in London" special starring LUCILLE BALL.

And Steve's directing "crown jewel" is now the stuff of legends. TV Guide called it "the second greatest musical moment in television history next to the Beatles' debut on 'The Ed Sullivan Show'." It was titled simply, "ELVIS." Today it's known as "The Comeback Special," all by itself a very significant contribution to the development of broadcasting.



BROADCASTING MILESTONE — 40 YEARS AGO SEPTEMBER, 1972 — "M*A*S*H" PREMIERS ON CBS-TV

Based on the novel by Richard Hooker and the movie, "M*A*S*H" premiered on CBS-TV on September 17, 1972. The show became one of the most celebrated series in the history of the medium.

Developed for TV by LARRY GELBART, the stories follow a team of doctors and support staff stationed at the 4077th Mobile Army Surgical Hospital in South Korea during the Korean War.



During its initial season, "M*A*S*H" was in danger of being canceled due to low ratings. The show reached the top ten program list the following year when is was moved to Saturdays and sandwiched between "All in the Family" and "The Mary Tyler Moore Show." It never fell below the top 20 rated programs during the remainder of its run. The final episode was a two and one half hour special that attracted the largest audience to ever tune into a single TV episode.



The original TV cast assumed roles created in Robert Altman's movie. The protagonists were Dr. Benjamin Franklin "Hawkeye" Pierce (ALAN ALDA) and Dr. "Trapper" John McIntyre (WAYNE ROGERS). Although excellent surgeons, Pierce and McIntyre preferred to chase female nurses and

drink homemade gin to operating, and had little use for military discipline or authority. As a result, they often ran afoul of staunch military types Dr. Frank Burns (LARRY LINVILLE) and Senior Nurse, Major Margaret "Hot Lips" Houlihan (PPB honoree LORETTA SWIT).

Regulars were camp commander Lt. Col. Henry Blake (McCLEAN STEVENSON), company clerk Corporal Walter "Radar" O'Reilly (GARY BURGHOFF), Corporal Max Klinger (PPB honoree JAMIE FARR), and Father Francis Mulcahy (WILLIAM CHRISTOPHER).

During its run, the series experienced many cast changes. Newcomers included Dr. B.J. Hunnicutt (**MIKE FARRELL**), Dr. Charles Emerson Winchester (**DAVID OGDEN STIERS**), and Colonel Sherman Potter (**HARRY MORGAN**).

After 281 episodes, "M*A*S*H" ended its 11-year network run in 1983, but can still be seen in syndication.
